Cities nationwide could access federal funds for slum clearance

People who lived in cheap lodging houses in the congested part of any large city - Alice Willard Solenberger, One Thousand Homeless Men, 1911



CITIES AND HOMELESSNESS

- Cities are the main site of the nation's growing homelessness crisis
- Key driver: rising cost of housing
- Cities can increase the housing supply and reduce housing costs through their control over land use/zoning policies
- This research evaluates whether local governments:
 - Are connecting their homelessness and land use policies
 - See homelessness as a housing problem



'A dire situation': Surging rents and housing shortage spark homelessness in Lawrence

Housing instability has long gripped Lawrence, where rent increases fueled by a lack of supply and a growing population have pushed hundreds to the brink of homelessness, or the streets.

WHY MIGHT CITIES STRUGGLE TO MAKE THESE CONNECTIONS?

 Local governments are responsive to residents and businesses who are concerned about the negative externalities of unsheltered homelessness

 State and federal governments, which are very influential actors in homelessness policy, largely are not making this connection

Supply skepticism

DATA

 Housing and homeless plans from the nation's 100 largest cities (data collected in summer 2022)

Survey of mayors of cities over 75,000 in summer 2021 (n=116) and 2023 (n=114)

HOMELESS AND HOUSING PLANS PLANS


- Only 54% of the 100 largest cities have homeless plans!
- Virtually all cities (99%) had a housing plan available online
 - 76% of these plans mention homelessness at least once

HOUSING SUPPLY IN HOMELESSNESS AND HOUSING PLANS

- Only 30% of homelessness plans mention zoning/land use the most important policy tools for increasing the housing supply
- Only 16% of housing plans connected land use and homelessness policy


What do you think is the single biggest cause of homelessness in your city?




SURVEY OF MAYORS

- "It's a mental illness and lack of desire to be within housing. To not want to be house. And drug and alcohol addiction. These are people who want to live on the street and they don't want to take advantage of the shelters that we have,"
- "I want to mention two [causes], because it's the co-occurring issues with addiction and mental health."





CONCLUSION

Cities and their leaders do not:

- See homelessness as a housing problem
- Connect homelessness and housing supply in important policy documents

Instead...

- Support more reactive and punitive solutions to homelessness that exacerbate the problem
- Federal government unlikely to be a helpful leader in this space in the coming years



HALF A MILLION HOMELESS

Rising Rates and Systemic Challenges

Record Increase in Homelessness

Homelessness in the U.S. increased by 18% in 2024, reaching over 770,000 individuals, the highest since tracking began in 2007.

Surge in Family Homelessness

Family homelessness rose by 39%, highlighting economic and housing affordability challenges.

WHAT THE EVIDENCE SAYS: AN OVERVIEW



BUILDING EVIDENCE

Permanent Supportive Housing

A 'Housing First' approach providing long-term housing and support services without preconditions.

Pathways to Housing: Pioneered the Housing First model, demonstrating significant reductions in homelessness.

HUD-VASH: A successful program reducing veteran homelessness by providing vouchers and case management.

Family Options Study: Showed that long-term subsidies reduce family homelessness and improve economic stability.



BUILDING EVIDENCE

Rapid Re-Housing

A short-term intervention providing rental assistance and case management to quickly move people into housing.

Core Components: Includes rent subsidies, housing search assistance, and supportive services to ensure stability.

Family Options Study Findings: Showed mixed results—some families secured housing, but long-term impacts on stability were unclear.

Cost-Effectiveness: Less expensive than permanent housing, but effectiveness is not known.

Much more to learn: we need more evidence about these kinds of intermediate options




EVIDENCE OF IMPACT

Key Findings

- Decreased homelessness that persists over time
- Those not receiving assistance are 3 times more likely to experience homelessness
- Every \$1 spent on EFA resulted in benefits of \$2.47
